The Burgomafter of Cologne.

The memorable instance of courage related of Gryn,*) the burgomaster of Cologne, occurred during the contest between the inhabitants of that city and the archbishop Engelbert II., in 1262.

Gryn, as it is related, having been invited to dine with the archbishop, was received, on his arrival at the archiepiscopal palace, by two monks, who, instead of conducting him to the banquet-room, forced him into a court-yard in which a lion was kept; not doubting, by this means, to get rid of their formidable adversary. The intrepid burgomaster, however, boldly encountered and slew his terrific assailant, and was soon after triumphantly delivered by his fellow-citizens, who has uspected some treachery might have been meditated against him. The emperor Rodolphus put an end to the

quarrel between the town and the archbishop by ordering a public combat between the troops of each party for the possession of the keys of the town. Gryn, at the head of the citizens, won the victory, and thus preserved the rights of his fellow-townsmen.

With the present exquisite sketch, the series of designs is completed.

The event which forms the subject of the poem is commemorated in front of a bow-window of the town-hall of Cologne: another representation in relief, and in good preservation, ornamented also a similar window in the interior of the court of the same edifice. **)
