CHAPTER I.

Personification of Death, and other modes of representing it among the Ancients, and during the Middle Ages.—Erroneous notions respecting Death.—Monumental absurdities.—Allegorical pageant of the Dance of Death represented in early times in churches and cemeteries.—Introduction of the infernal, or dance of Macaber.



HE manner in which the poets and artists of antiquity have symbolized or personified Death, has excited considerable discussion; and the various opinions of Lessing, Herder, Klotz, and other controversialists, have only tended to demonstrate that the ancients adopted many different modes to ac-

complish this purpose. Some writers have maintained that they exclusively represented Death as a mere skeleton; whilst others have contended that this figure, so frequently to be found upon gems and sepulchral monuments, was never intended to personify the extinction of human life, but only as a simple and abstract representation.
